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## DEAR MEMBERS,

Please accept for your consideration the Students' Union's Annual Report covering September 2020 to August 2021.

This was a unique year for many of us. With the 2020-2021 school year being held almost exclusively online, the Students' Union took a different approach to the services, advocacy, and campus life that we offer students and found new ways to connect with members.

Campus life continued throughout the year with virtual events. From Netflix movie nights to online game nights and guided painting, our online events allowed members to stay connected during this challenging time.

We continued to support the important work of the DSU Collectives through virtual events such as the DSU Accessibility Collective's guided stretching, the DSU Indigenous Students' Collectives virtual Artisans Fair, the Pride Collective's socials and Pride month celebrations, and the Womens' Collective's movie screenings and self-defense workshops.

A major campaign that we worked on during the 2020-2021 year was our election campaign called, Take it Over. The goal of the Take it Over campaign was to increase and encourage youth participation in the October 24 Provincial Election. This was also the first full year that the Students' Union was signed on to the Moosehide and Period Promise campaigns, and we were able to do a lot of work on both of those campaigns, including participating in our first Moosehide Campaign Day in February 2021.

Throughout the year, we saw an increase in membership engagement through our online spaces such as our DS App and on all our social media platforms. We used Instagram and Facebook as our main way to interact and communicate with members.

Services were expanded to offer more to support members: we created more business partnerships in the Deals App to offer more discounts for members, expanded the emergency food bank to allow for students to request egift cards for financial food support, and created a program to mail students handbooks to anywhere in Canada.

The DSU building was open for the majority of the 2020-2021 year. Summer 2021, we saw a slow increase in members returning to campus over the summer semester, and by August 2021 we were able to re-open our student lounges and study spaces at both campuses in a safe manner for members.

Looking at the year ahead, we will continue to offer and expand the most important services to our members. We will continue to build our community online, and in-person for members to stay connected and safe, and we will continue to focus on advocating for increased access to post-secondary education. We have been able to accomplish a lot this past year and these goals were only achieved because of the support and work of you, our members. We hope to continue to work together with you, tackling the challenges on the road ahead.

## **CLUBS**

Students' Union clubs are a great way for members to make connections & build social networks outside of the classroom on common interests. It was a busy year of club activities, engagement, and improvements to services to support clubs.

#### **Club Registration Packages**

- 13 club packages received and accepted in Fall 2020
- 5 packages received and accepted in Winter 2021.
- There were 18 ratified clubs and the Students' Union allocated \$4,788 in funding based on requests from clubs.

#### **Clubs Fair Events**

## VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

The DSU Crew volunteer program was created as a way for members to have an opportunity to engage with the Students' Union on events and campaigns, the program is a way to train members on the work of the Students' Union.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the volunteer program was put on pause for the majority of the 2020-2021 year. In February 2021, the Students' Union began meeting to transition the volunteer program to an online format for members.

The program transitioned to a points-based system for volunteers to collect points based on the different tasks available.

With the new volunteer format, the Students' Union began to advertise the volunteer program and again and hosted trainings on:

As of May 2021, there were 16 active volunteers.

In the Summer of 2021, when Douglas College announced that classes and services would begin to return to campus, the Students' Union decided to resume in-person volunteer training sessions and volunteer program.

#### THE DS APP

The DS App is a platform where members can access information on Students' Union services and connect with other Douglas members through the social tools.

The Students' Union partners with DC Global Engagement and International Education departments to deliver more information to members. This was a partnership created in early 2020 and continued into 2021.

#### **BULLETIN BOARDS & CONCOURSE/ATRIUMS**

The Students' Union limited the use of bulletin boards and rolling boards in Concourse and Atrium as the main form of communication to members this year as not a lot of students were on campus. In Summer 2021, the Students' Union began to use rolling boards and bulletin boards on campus as students began to visit campus for in-person services.

#### **CLASS TALKS**

The Students' Union was invited to speak at 6 classes in September 2020 and 2 classes in January 2021 about the Students' Union (as part of Welcome Weeks).

#### **E-NEWSLETTER**

In fall 2020, the Students' Union launched an e-newsletter to members using the program Constant Contact. The e-newsletter was sent out monthly and included upcoming campus life, services, and advocacy information. The newsletter was also used to email members when prizes were won and for follow-up feedback from events. The E-newsletter had over 2200 members sign up throughout the year. The students' union sent out 14 newsletters updates during the 2020-2021 year.

During the 2020-21 year, all Students' Union communications continued to be in online formats. The Students' Union utilized all platforms to keep members updated and as informed as possible. The Students' Union supported members with questions they had about updates or requests for Douglas College.

It was a busy year for the Students' Union with campaign and advocacy work. Even though COVID-19 disrupted many plans, the Students' Union was still able to accomplish many goals and achieve some important wins for members. Working together with over 170,000 students from 15 students' unions across the province through the British Columbia Federation of Students, we share our collective wins together and continue the fight towards our common goal to make post-secondary education more accessible and affordable.

## TAKE IT OVER

September 2020 started off with the Students' Union working on an election campaign for the Provincial Election, called 'Take it Over'. The campaign was mainly promoted online to members to encourage students to get out and vote on October 24, 2020.

During the election campaign, the Students' Union hosted Candidate Q&As on zoom with candidates in the New Westminster and Coquitlam-Burke Mountain ridings. During the Q&As, candidates were asked questions to allow students to get to know them better and the issues that they were prioritizing in their platforms. These sessions were recorded over zoom and released to students afterwards.

The Students' Union also conducted a giveaway incentive to encourage students to pledge to vote in the election. Students who signed the pledge to vote were automatically entered into the giveaway and then additional bonus entries were entered when they shared and tagged friends on social media.





## OPEN TEXTBOOKS NOW!

Fall 2020, the Students' Union ran an Academic Materials survey amongst members to learn about The survey ran throughout the month of September 2020 and asked about student experiences with academic materials, textbooks, and Open Educational Resources (OERs).

From the information gathered, the Students' Union put together a report outlining the findings and submitted the report to Douglas College to advocate for additional Open Educational Resources.

Here are some highlights from the data reported in the survey:

- Over 77% of students were surprised by the cost of academic materials (and not in a good way)
- Over 74% said that academic materials cost more than expected (what a horrible surprise)
- Over 70% of students did not buy recommended materials because it was cost prohibitive
- 66% of students had to pay additional money for access codes (another bad surprise)
- Over 90% would use an OER if it were available as an option
- Students would utilize different options to access OERs print, digital and a combination of both

The Students' Union also announced and committed to an annual \$3000 contribution to the Douglas College OER Grant to support new OER adoptions at Douglas College.

## EARTH WEEK

April 16-23, 2021, the Students' Union celebrated Earth Week to bring awareness to climate crisis and sustainability to members.

Each day highlighted a different aspect of Earth Week; Climate Crisis & SDG accord, Plastic Pollution, Biodiversity, Clothing Industry, and Sustainable Food, and how students can learn more about Earth Week and sustainability issues.

The Students' Union also signed on to the SDG (Sustainable Development Goals) accord as an organization, which was created by the United Nations. The SDG accord are high goals set for a better future.

## MOOSEHIDE CAMPAIGN

February 11, 2021, the Students' Union participated in the Nationwide Moosehide Campaign Day. This event happened virtually with members attending to show support and to recognize the issues that Indigenous women and girls still face today.

The Moosehide Campaign is a grassroots movement of Indigenous and non-Indigenous men and boys who are standing up against violence towards women and children. The campaign was created to support each other and stand together to end violence towards women and children.




#### Fall 2020 - September 28 - October 2, 2020







May 27, 2021, 215 bodies of Indigenous children which were found in a mass burial site at a former Kamloops Residential school. In response to the discovery, the Douglas Students' Union put up 215 orange ribbons at both campuses of Douglas College for 215 days. These ribbons were placed to encourage members to remember why they are there and take time to remember the children that were taken by the hands of residential schools and other unfair practices towards Indigenous people that continue to happen.



Last year, the Students' Union implemented weekly virtual office hours to support members. This service continued this year. Virtual Office Hours are held on Tuesdays 1:00pm-3:00pm and Thursdays 10:00am-12:00pm on Zoom. Students are invited to drop in with any questions for the Students' Union.

## HEALTH AND DENTAL PLAN

The Students' Union's Health and Dental plan is a brokered service provided by the insurer Green Shield Canada and brokered by Gallivan and Associates. Gallivan and Associates is a subsidiary of the publicly traded company People Corporation.

January 2021, the Students' Union created a video to help students with the opt-in process for the Health and Dental plan. This video was distributed across all social media platforms. Plans were made to create additional videos to support other aspects of the Health and Dental plan.

## MEMBER HANDBOOK AND DAYPLANNER

The Students' Union produces its annual handbook through a service of the BC Federation of Students. The British Columbia Federation of Students continually keeps the price stable, with handbooks arriving early in August every year in time for orientation and welcome back events.

- Handbooks were delivered on time, at the end of August 2021.
- Decreased number of Handbooks ordered this year to 6500.

## DEALS APP

The Deals App is a discount program designed to help students save money on services and at restaurants, retail shops, fitness studios and even travel companies across BC.

#### Solicitation of Discounts for 2020-21

Secured 17 discounts from businesses.

### **Promotion of Deals App**

- Promoted program through posters on campus and social media
- With the increased number of businesses on the program, promotion was found to be easier, as students recognized businesses on the plan.
- The BC Federation of Students created a Facebook page for the Deals App to widely share the
  provincial-wide discounts for students. The Students' Union shares BC wide and local businesses
  which are shared though that page.

## MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND MEMBER SUPPLIES

#### Fall 2020 Materials

- Ordered \$17,000 worth of materials from the BCFS bulk purchase store with Fairware, in August 2020, and materials arrived for September 2020.
- Materials included: water bottles, notebooks, reusable shopping bags, touch tools, pens, highlighters, stickers, and lanyards.
- Materials were well received by members
- The students' Union also ordered branded cloth face masks and hand sanitizers for members for a total of \$13,400. This order was not done through Fairware, but outsourced through other companies like Union Proud.

#### Winter 2021 Materials

- Ordered \$7,725 worth of additional materials to restock from Fall 2020, along with some new limited additional items to provide members at the 2021 Annual General Meeting.
- Items included: pens, highlighters, dark green T-shirts, and grey crewneck sweatshirts.

#### 2021 - 22 Materials

- Ordered \$30,700 worth of branded materials for members from the BCFS bulk purchase store with Fairware.
- Materials included: navy sweatshirts, purple t-shirts, white t-shirts (DSU Crew), ceramic travel mugs, sweatpants, crewneck sweatshirts, toques, visors, dad hats, water bottles, cutlery sets, reusable shopping bags, pencil cases, sunglasses, flag tab sets, sunflower and basil planters, pens, highlights, and notebooks.
- These items will be given to members starting September 2021.

## DS APP - READY EDUCATION MOBILE APP

The READY Education mobile app is provided to Douglas members in the form of the DS app. The app service is an important function in providing an avenue of communication between the Students' Union Board and members. In addition to its membership development functions, the app also provides a valuable service to students.

#### 2020-21 Usage:

- 1700+ accounts created
- 100k+ messages amongst members
- 800+ connections between members
- 500+ posts

The app also supported members accessing services digitally with close to 1000 clicks to update monthly U-Pass, 1500+ accessing their Blackboard/MyAccount and 800+ accessing the Deals app and links to other Students' Union services. It also acted as a source of information about COVID-19 for members with a tile dedicated to COVID-19 information.

## U-PASS BC

The Students' Union participates in the U-Pass BC Program along with all other students' unions at the public post-secondary institutions in the lower mainland. The program provides for a unified U-Pass across the region under which all members pay a common price, and the total cost of the service is subsidized by the government of BC. The program is implemented through a series of contracts between government, students' unions, institutions and the transit provider, TransLink. The current agreement limits increases to 2% annually until 2025.

#### **Response to COVID-19:**

The Students' Union worked with TransLink, Douglas College and 9 other post-secondary institutions and their student unions to reintroduce the U-Pass for the Fall 2021, as classes were returning to inperson and on campus. Students who were registered in classes that were categorized as on campus were assessed the U-Pass fee, and students whose classes continued online were not assessed the U-Pass fee.

## HERE2TALK

Following years of advocating for more mental health support for members and working in consultation with students across the province, the BC Government announced an early launch of its mental health counselling and referral service for post-secondary students.

The service, called Here2Talk, is a welcome aid for those currently struggling with the uncertainty brought about by COVID-19.

This service is free to all public post-secondary students and meant to support and complement counselling services provided by institutions. It offers confidential, free, single-session services by app, phone, or online chat 24 hours a day, seven days a week. ## STUDENT GRANT FUND

The Student Grant Fund is designed to support members engaged in student initiatives at Douglas College and other post-secondary institutions. The fund provides grants that will support and encourage participation in conferences, lectures, events, and competitions centered on students and enhancing educational experiences.

## FINANCIAL AID

The Students' Union funds a number of awards, bursaries and emergency aid programs administered through the Douglas College Financial Aid office. The aid is focused on financial need and is accessible to domestic and international students in all programs. The awards include the DSU Mature Students' Bursary, DSU Daycare Bursary, DSU Domestic Student Award and the DSU Emergency Bursary.

Financial aid can be accessed directly from the Financial Aid Office at Douglas College.

## EMERGENCY FOOD BANK

In response to COVID-19 campus closures, the food bank service transitioned to online and during the 2020-21 year, the food bank service continued in an online format. The service offered \$30.00 e-gift cards that were emailed to members directly. Students were eligible to apply for the food bank twice per semester, but only once per month.

Over 1700 e-gift cards were sent out to members for the emergency food bank between September 2020-August 2021

## FIRST AID CLASSES

With the ongoing pandemic, the Students' Union delayed bringing back first aid courses for Fall 2020. In Winter 2021 the Students' Union held 2 courses in-person in the Student Union Building as a trial back to in-person.

The DSU First Aid courses are partially subsidized by the Students' Union for members. The cost to members starts at \$50 per course, after the DSU subsidy.

Summer 2021, full service of first aid courses resumed. Courses offered were Emergency First Aid, Standard First and CPR C, and Standard First aid with Basic Life Saving courses. All courses were filled with safety protocols in place.

## PRINTING SERVICES

Printing services transitioned to bringing a USB to the front desk for support with printing. Students are offered 100 free black and white prints each semester from the Students' Union.

## **LOCKERS**

Throughout the 2020-2021 year, locker rentals continued but at a decreased rate. Locker rentals were available for students each semester for \$10/semester.

The Students' Union also continued to hold on to members items from old lockers during this time, if members were unable to come to campus to pick up their items, as a result of the pandemic closures.

## **OMBUDSPERSON**

To date, Douglas College does not have an independent ombudsperson service to assist members with appeals, conflicts and disputes on matters relating to student rights and fairness. As mandated by the Bylaws, the Students' Union provides an ombudsperson service to assist members.


Ombudsperson Drop-In's continued in 2020-2021 virtually, on Zoom.

The number of members that the Ombudsperson support has grown steadily over the past 5 years and has seen an increase of over 200% in 2020-21 from 2016-17 alone.

The cases the Ombudsperson support members range from conflicts in the classroom between instructors and members, final grade appeals, academic dishonesty concerns to accommodation issues. This year there was an increase in academic dishonesty and other concerns related to COVID-19, remote and online learning, and adapting to learning back on campus.

## EMERGENCY MENSTRUAL PRODUCTS

The Students' Union continued to offer free menstrual products for students in all washrooms in the students' union building. They were also available for pick up from the kiosk in Coquitlam as needed. Products available include pads and tampons, as well as condom (internal & external). The students' union advocated for the college to provide these items in the washrooms of the college throughout the year as well.





## STUDENTS' UNION BUILDING AND SPACES

The Students' Union operates spaces at both the New Westminster and Coquitlam campuses. The Students' Union Building in New Westminster is a fully separate and operated building, while the spaces at Coquitlam serving members are integrated into the AB Building.

In fall 2020, the DSU front desk and kiosk opened for in person services and support to members. Opening hours were reduced and safety protocols were implemented to accommodate re-opening during the pandemic.

Office hours were Tuesday-Friday 10:00am-3:00pm in Coquitlam and Monday-Thursday 10:00am-3:00pm in New Westminster. Summer 2021, the DSU front desk and kiosk resumed normal hours, Monday-Friday 9:30am-4:30pm at both campuses.

The DSU meeting rooms, student lounges and offices were closed to members for the majority of the 2020-21 year, due to the ongoing pandemic.

In summer 2021, the Students' Union began re-opening student lounges and offices to better support students in person.

#### **Open Letter to the Prime Minister**

February 8, 2021, the Students' Union participated in a Canada-wide Week of Action to Knock Out Interest on Canada Student Loans. In support of this week of action, the Students' Union and Justice Institute Students' Union joined together to create a video open letter to Prime Minister Trudeau.

The video included students and members of the community who are impacted by interest on student loans in Canada. The video included: current and former post-secondary students and alumni, high school teachers and students, parents, and community members from across the country, all asking Prime Minister Justin Trudeau to eliminate interest on student loans. The video was shared across all social media platforms and viewed by over 2.7k people.

## LOCAL GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

The Students' Union meets and corresponds regularly with local city government bodies to address issues facing members within the communities and to discuss opportunities to work together on community events and campaigns.

#### **City of New Westminster**

City Councilors - On July 28, 2021, the Students' Union and Douglas College held a Pride Flag Raising at the New Westminster Campus, where City Councilor, Chuck Puchmayr attended.

### **City of Coquitlam**

City Councilors - On July 29, 2021, the Students' Union and Douglas College held a Pride Flag Raising at the Coquitlam Campus where 3 Coquitlam City Councilors attended.

## COLLEGE RELATIONS

Over the past year, the Students' Union has strengthened its relationship with Douglas College at various levels. There is strong student representation at decision making governance bodies at the college and strong relationships with individuals including the various vice presidents and directors that represent administration, front line staff that provide services to members as well as many faculty members.

## RELATIONS WITH SENIOR MANAGEMENT TEAM

The Students' Union meets every semester with members of the Senior Management Team through the Joint Operations Committee. The meetings offer the opportunity to discuss issues facing members, student initiatives, and operational considerations affecting both parties.

The Director of College Relations and a staff member regularly attend meetings of the Senior Management Team to provide feedback and ask questions about policy changes and updates as they relate to the member experience at Douglas College.

With the outbreak of COVID-19, the Students' Union corresponded regularly with members of the Senior Management Team to express the concerns of members and worked together to address issues as they arose throughout the winter and summer semester.

## ACADEMIC LEARNING CHALLENGES

### Meeting with Vice-President Academic and Provost and Vice-President Academic and Student Affairs and Director of Student Affairs & Services

# PROPOSAL TO DOUGLAS COLLEGE: SUPPLYING EMERGENCY MENSTRUAL PRODUCTS AT DOUGLAS COLLEGE

In summer 2021, the Students' Union worked on a proposal to Douglas College, for the college to supply emergency menstrual products in all washrooms on campus. This work was ongoing throughout the summer semester and ready to submit to the college Senior Management Team August 2021. The proposal outlined the need for emergency menstrual products by the college community, how not having access to menstrual products provides an unnecessary barrier for academic success.

The proposal formally requested Douglas College to fund and supply emergency menstrual products in all washrooms at all campuses. Students and the whole Douglas community deserve and should have a dignified experience on campus. Douglas College can ensure a welcoming and comfortable environment by providing emergency menstrual products to support students managing a basic, normal biological function without interference with their academic success or barrier to their education. By knowing that their biological and menstrual needs are met while they are on campus, students can focus on their education rather than their menstrual management needs. This simple but powerful action will demonstrate to students Douglas College's commitment to their success. It demonstrates leadership in combating stigma and period poverty and creates an equitable environment for all genders.

The Students' Union met with the Senior Management Team in September 2021.

## COLLEGE GOVERNANCE

#### **College Board**

The Students' Union sends representatives to observe College Board meetings and keeps the Board of Directors informed of issues arising at the meetings. The Students' Union also works with the elected students on the College Board to ensure they are able to present their views and represent members in discussions and decisions.

#### **Education Council**

The Students' Union sends representatives to observe Education Council meetings and keep the Board of Directors informed of issues arising at the meeting. The Students' Union also works with the elected students on the Education Council to ensure they are able to present their views and represent members in discussions and decisions.

## 2020-2021 BUDGET CONSULTATIONS

The Students' Union undertook significant work to present a comprehensive budget proposal for investments in key services, financial aid systems and open educational resources.

The Students' Union undertook a consultation process with members in the form of virtual zoom chats about where they felt Douglas College should allocated funds in their 2021-2022 budget.

The zoom chats happened over a 2-week period and allowed students to drop in to discuss the topics they felt needed to be highlighted and prioritized in the budget.

- November 16 & 23, 2020 Quality of Education
- November 17, 2020 Services
- November 19, 2020 Tuition & Ancillary Fees
- November 25, 2020 Technology
- November 27, 2020 International Students

These consultations zoom chats were recorded and the Students' Union created the Budget Submission based on the content students brought forward in these sessions.

Recommendations put forward included improving the student consultation process, capping international tuition fees from exceeding the rate of domestic fee increases, increasing open educational resources, increasing services for international members, increasing college service hours, and improving on campus parking.

The Budget Recommendations were submitted to Douglas College Senior Management Team in December 2020.

#### Link to Budget Consultation Submission by the DSU

February 8, 2021 Douglas College hosted a Student Forum for the Douglas College Budget. Students were invited to share their feedback on the 2021-2022 Budget. The forum was online, and there was a significant increase in attendance from students compared to the previous year.

## OTHER COLLEGE COMMITTEES, INITIATIVES AND DEPARTMENTS

#### **Open Douglas Working Group**

The Students' Union participates at the Open Douglas Working Group, which is composed of faculty and staff to discuss initiatives to promote open learning and OER adoptions on campus.

#### **Mental Wellness Strategy Initiative Working Group**

The Students' Union sends one staff and student representative to participate in the Douglas College Mental Wellness Strategy Initiative Working Group, which is composed of faculty, staff, and students to discuss mental health strategies to implement at Douglas College.

#### **Student Services Advisory Committee**

The Students' Union sends one staff and student representative to participate in the Douglas College Student Services Advisory committee, which is composed of Douglas staff and students to discuss in person and virtual service improvements on campus.

#### **Student Housing Project and Consultation**

May 2021, the Students' Union submitted a letter of support for the Development Project at 808 Royal Avenue. This project is to create a new building for Douglas College that would include on campus student housing.

Directors and Staff of the Students' Union participated in all levels of Douglas College's consultation process, providing feedback and recommendations on the needs of students.

### **Relations with Institutional Staff and Faculty**

The Students' Union has a generally positive relationship with institutional staff, who are members of the British Columbia Government and Service Employees Union (BCGEU), Local 703.

Members of the Board of Directors participate regularly with the institution's faculty on various College committees, and the Students' Union continues to share a strong relationship with faculty, who are organized with the Federation of Post-Secondary Educators of BC, Local 4.

### Relationship with Douglas College Student Life

The Students' Union maintains a positive relationship with Douglas College Student Life, working closely throughout the year on events, such as New Student Orientation, EDGE, and mental health awareness events. The Students' Union and Student Life support each other throughout the year by sharing events on social media and encouraging involvement of members to all events at Douglas College.

This positive relationship has continued while we have transitioned to online engagement, and both parties support each other via social media whenever possible.

## INTERNAL AFFAIRS & FINANCES

It was a busy year for the Students' Union internally, work was undertaken to ensure compliance with government regulatory statutes with the BC Societies Act and the College and Institutes Act which governs how the Board of Directors run the union and how fees are collected. Due to COVID-19, the Students' Union had to make adjustments to operations to fulfill fiduciary obligations.

## GOVERNANCE

#### **BC Societies Act**

The Students' Union operates under the BC Societies Act and remained in compliance with the Act through the 2020-21 year.

#### **College and Institute Act**

The Students' Union maintains compliance with the College and Institute Act in order to ensure that its fees, and the fees it collects in trust, can be maintained by Douglas College. The Students' Union was in compliance with the Act through the 2020-21 year.

### **BC** Lobbyist Act

The BC Lobbyist Act came into effect in May 2020, the Students' Union remained in compliance with the Act through the 2020-21 year.

### **Annual General Meeting**

The Students' Union held its Annual General Meeting on January 27, 2021, virtually, on Zoom in Webinar format. The meeting was quorate with more than 60 members participating. Members received the 2019-20 annual report and approved the 2019-20 audited financial statements.

All members who attended the Annual General Meeting received a prize for attending the meeting. The Students' Union followed up with all attendees via email for contact and mailing information. Prizes were then mailed out the following week.

#### **Board of Directors Elections**

The Students' Union held its annual election between January 25 and February 12, 2021, with two slates of candidates and two individual candidates running for office.

The election was held entirely online, and voting was conducted online through ElectionBuddy. After five days of online voting across, over 1000 members cast ballots.

#### **Board of Directors Orientation**

The Students' Union's Board Orientation was held virtually over Zoom May 3-6, 2021. The sessions were hosted by the staff of the Students' Union and assisted by BC Federation of Students Organizer, Jenelle Davies.

Sessions held at the meeting taught Directors about the Students' Union's structures and finances, the legal responsibilities of directors, staffing and labour relations, and the regular responsibilities of directors. The board used the time to develop a set of basic goals and plans for the year ahead.

### **Strategic Planning**

A Strategic Planning session was held in Summer 2021 between the Executive and staff of the Students' Union.

Normally the session is a one full day meeting to discuss goals and priorities and to strategize short term and long-term initiatives. Due to COVID-19 public health orders, the Executive and staff met over two days, one session was held on Zoom on June 28, 2021, and another in-person on July 7, 2021

There were no bylaw amendments made during the 2020-2021 year.

The Students' Union regularly reviews and updates the policies of the organization. During this year, policies revised were:

#### **Regular Staff and Staffing Changes**

The Students' Union employs 6 full-time staff. There were no changes in regular staffing during the academic year.

In August 2021, the DSU went through a staffing re-structuring that included re-assigning roles and 1 new position being created. The Students' Union began engaging in the hiring process for a new Organizer – Campus Life and Organizer - Campaigns.

#### **Student Staffing**

The Students' Union employed 5 members in part-time positions to work at the front desk in New Westminster and the kiosk in Coquitlam.

## FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

#### **Audited Financial Statements**

The Students' Union's fiscal year is September 1 to August 31. Each September and October, the Students' Union prepares its annual financial statements for auditing, a process that occurs in November and December each year. The following January, the audited statements are adopted by the Board and forwarded to the membership at the annual general meeting.

#### 2019-20 Audited Financial Statements

The Students' Union's 2019-20 financial statements were prepared on time and audited prior to December 2020. The statements, along with the auditor's report were presented at the annual general meeting held January 27, 2021 and received by the general membership.

#### 2020-21 Audited Financial Statements

Work on the 2020-21 financial statements began in late August 2021 and the bulk of the statement and audit preparation was completed by December 2021. The audited financial statements and report of the auditor will be presented to the general membership in January 2022 at the annual general meeting.

#### **Donations**

June 7, 2021, the Students' Union donated \$1000 to the Indian Residential School Survivors Society.

#### **Dues Collection**

The Students' Union collects its fees through automatic assessment and collection by Douglas College in accordance with the College and Institute Act. The Students' Union also uses the same mechanism to collect fees on behalf of the British Columbia Federation of Students.

#### Students' Union Fees

The Students' Union fees were increased in 2020-21 by the rate of change in the consumer price index for Vancouver per the Students' Union's bylaws.

#### **British Columbia Federation of Students Fees**

The Students' Union collects fees on behalf of the British Columbia Federation of Students consistent with Douglas students' membership in the Federation. In 2020-21 the fees for the BCFS were increased by the rate of inflation per the organization's bylaws.

#### **General Meetings**


#### 79TH SEMI-ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - JULY 2021
